CHARTER

Small Town and Rural Council

Adopted: April 17, 2021. Amended July 17, 2021; September 7, 2024; November 14, 2025.

Purpose

As an advisory entity to the WSBA Board of Governors, the Small Town and Rural (STAR) Council is committed to strengthen and support the practice of law in the rural communities throughout Washington state. Members of the STAR Council will work to ensure that the practice of law in rural communities is present, growing, and thriving.

Practitioners in rural communities are few and far between. Additionally, many of these practitioners are nearing retirement without a clear plan of succession for their clients, leaving a void of access to legal representation and counsel. The STAR Council will guide policy & program development, serves as ambassadors between the WSBA and these communities, explore and advocate for creative and innovative solutions, and regularly assess the legal landscape in rural communities to determine if WSBA policy, advocacy and program development require further resource for sustainability and improvements.

The STAR Council aligns with the authorized activities outlined in General Rule 12. More specifically, GR 12.1 (a) articulates the Washington Supreme Court’s regulatory objective to provide, in part, “meaningful access to justice. . .” while GR 12.1(d) strives for “affordable and accessible legal services.” In addition, the STAR Council aligns with the authorized activities outlined in GR 12.2, in particular by providing “services to members and the public,” and “fostering collegiality among its members and goodwill between the legal profession and the public.”

Further, the STAR Council furthers the WSBA mission to serve the public and the members of the Bar by providing focused attention on the unique needs of residents and members in rural areas both by improving access to legal practitioners in rural communities and outreach and development of a pipeline of younger rural residents to pursue a legal career and serve their communities.

Definition of “Rural”

For the purpose of the STAR Council and reflective of Washington’s unique geographic and sociogeographic landscape, the definition of “rural” is as follows:

Based on the definitions produced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Economic Research Service (ERS) and an overview of Washington county population, we focused on counties with populations of less than 50,000 and more than 2,500. These areas are considered ‘urban nonmetro areas not part of larger labor markets’ by ERS. As part of the working definition, and for ease, we have termed these counties as ‘rural.’ Based upon WA county population data, we’ve pursued a hypothesis that counties with 30,000 or more are rural, but likely adjacent to a labor market and perhaps have a varying set of circumstances that may differ from counties that are less than 30,000.

This definition will serve as the “per se” definition of rural. The STAR Council has the authority to change this definition based on specific programming objectives.

Composition

The member appointment process will follow the process for WSBA Committees. Members of the STAR Council should have demonstrated experience and/or interest in a thriving legal practice in Washington's rural communities. The STAR Council will consist of 13 members and are outlined as:

- Chair (voting member)
- 2 Current or Former WSBA Board of Governors Members (voting members)
- 1 Active WSBA Member At Large (voting member)
- 4 Active WSBA Members from rural communities - see above for definition of "rural" (voting members)
- 1 Active WSBA New Member, as defined in WSBA Bylaws (voting member)
- 3 Law School Representatives (voting members, must be currently employed with a WA Law School which is not currently represented on the Committee.)
- 1 Active WSBA Lawyer Member currently employed with a Qualified Legal Service Provider (QLSP) (voting member).

WSBA Staff Liaison: Member Services and Engagement Manager or staff member in the Advancement Department, non-voting.

Board of Governor Liaison: as assigned annually, non-voting.

Terms

- Chair: two-year term
- Members: three-year term

Initial Committee Terms

In FY21, the first appointments to the STAR Council were effectuated in a staggered rotation of STAR Council members. Therefore, the following terms were in place for the first appointment cycle only. All subsequent terms should adhere to the term limits stated above. STAR Council members serving an initial term less than three years, should be considered an incomplete term. Therefore, the member is eligible to serve two subsequent complete three-year terms per WSBA Bylaws.

- 2 Active WSBA Members
1 member with two-year term, 1 member with three-year term.
- 4 Active WSBA Members from rural communities (see above for definition)
1 member with one-year term, 1 member with two years term, 2 members with three-years term.
- 3 Law School Representatives (voting, must be currently employed with a WA Law School)
1 member with one-year term, 1 member with two-years term, 1 member with three-years term.

The following positions will begin as a standard term as set forth in this charter.

- Chair
- 1 Active WSBA New Member
- 1 Active WSBA Lawyer Member currently employed with a Qualified Legal Service Provider (QLSP).

Scope of Work

The scope of the STAR Council's work will focus on what the WSBA is uniquely positioned to do in supporting a sustaining and thriving environment for the practice of law and increase access to justice in Washington's rural communities. The STAR Council will work with all relevant and interested stakeholders to collaborate where needed. The provision of direct legal services and civil legal aid to the public is outside the scope of the STAR Council.

Measures of Success

- Increased awareness of the issues and possible solutions to address any gap in practicing members in rural communities.
- A sustainable pipeline of legal practitioners in rural communities.
- Increased numbers of legal practitioners in rural communities.
- The establishment of funding for programs and initiatives for the practice of law in rural communities.

STAR Council Roles

1. Community Education and Outreach

Coordinated efforts to educate members and potential members about the unique needs, opportunities and benefits of a rural practice. This can include, but should not be limited to, comprehensive information on WSBA's website, features in WSBA publications, presentations at high schools, law schools and community colleges. Meetings and events, such as a summit or symposium, to highlight the issue, convene interested stakeholders to share their concerns and strategize on possible solutions.

2. Pipeline and Placement Program(s)

Develop WSBA programming, or WSBA supported/partnered programming designed to build a pipeline of practitioners in rural areas as well as an incentive program to encourage members to explore a rural practice on a time-limited or multi-year timeframe. This role should explore a possible collaboration or strategic overlap with WSBA existing and future mentorship program(s). In particular, this role will require extensive strategic planning and identification of external stakeholder support and additional funding sources. Coordinate with law schools and other stakeholders regarding economic incentives to practice in rural areas.

3. Job Opportunities and Clearinghouse

Small Town and Rural Council

Utilize existing and future WSBA resources to support and highlight job opportunities in rural communities. This role should include making it easier, and perhaps more cost-effective, to add job postings to WSBA's service. Develop a clearing house to assist retiring members with succession planning and the buying/selling of a practice.

Committee Evaluation

The STAR Council should conduct an assessment within five years from the date of Board of Governors' initial approval of the STAR Committee by 1) conducting a survey of rural practitioners to provide stakeholder feedback regarding the impact of this Council to effectuate change in these areas, 2) assessing the scope of work to reflect impact and progress in this area and align with trends in the greater legal community, and 3) earnestly examining if the Council is necessary to continue the scope of work.

Introductions and Approval of April Meeting Minutes (President Elect Petrasek)

STAR Council Chair and WSBA President-Elect Kari Petrasek called the meeting to order at 12:11 p.m. On motion by STAR Council Member Philip Hunsucker, seconded by STAR Council Member Travis Pietila, the Council approved by unanimous vote the April STAR Council Meeting minutes (7-0-0).

WSBA Updates (President-Elect Petrasek and Julianne Unite)

Board of Governors updates

President-Elect Kari Petrasek reported on the recent Board of Governors (BOG) meeting, which was held May 1–2 in Wenatchee. The main highlight from the meeting was the appointment of new governors representing Districts 2, 7 North, and 8.

The STAR Council welcomed Hyun-Ji Lee as its newest member. Hyun-Ji joins the council as the representative for the Qualified Legal Service Provider position, and works at Unemployment Law Project.

WSBA Member Services and Engagement Manager Julianne Unite mentioned that an email would be sent following the meeting to remind STAR Council members that the application period for WSBA committees, groups, and related positions remains open until May 31st. There are four open seats on the STAR Council: the at-large seat, rural member seat, Seattle University seat, and new member seat. After reviewing the applications submitted to date, Julianne noted that there are not currently enough applicants to fill all open positions and encouraged council members to consider reapplying if eligible and to promote the opportunity within their networks. Julianne reminded council members to complete the STAR Summit attendance survey, even if they do not plan to attend.

STAR Council Presentation to the Board of Governors (Pres.-Elect Petrasek)

Survey

The subcommittee, which includes President-Elect Petrasek, Travis, Phil, and Past President Daniel Clark, met yesterday and made progress toward finalizing the survey questions. Once finalized, the questions will be reviewed and prepared for presentation to the STAR Council at the next scheduled meeting in June. WSBA Advancement Department Director Kevin Plachy explained that the subcommittee's primary goal is to draft a memo for presentation to the BOG, most likely recommending the continuance of the Council. The survey plays a key role in informing this memo. The memo will be circulated to the Council for approval prior to submission to the BOG. The target is to present the proposal to the BOG at its September meeting.

Project Updates

April 2026 Legal Lunchbox (Ashley Cummins)

STAR Council Member Ashley Cummins noted that the April Legal Lunchbox was a success and approximately 1600 people attended.

Summit Project Team (Ashley Cummins, Kevin Plachy, Michele Moore, Gloria Guizar)

Kevin reported that the registration page is live and that internal coordination is underway to feature the STAR Summit announcement in the "Take Note" newsletter distributed to all members, with the first eblast scheduled for Friday; two additional eblasts will follow—one approximately three to four weeks before the event and another one week prior—bringing the total planned eblasts to three. Kevin noted that the agenda has been finalized, all speakers have been confirmed, and a PDF eflyer is in its final editing stages; the flyer is linked from the registration page, and the goal is to complete the remaining edits before the Friday eblast so the link is fully available to members. Kevin confirmed that all rural grant recipients have been invited again this year. Julianne clarified that reasonable travel expenses for the grant recipients will be reimbursed in accordance with WSBA Fiscal Policy and that such costs will be covered by the STAR Council budget. Kevin announced a partnership with the Access to Justice (ATJ) Board for this year's summit, noting that the collaboration is reflected in promotional materials, including the forthcoming eblast and the e-flyer. Kevin highlighted that the Thursday evening reception preceding the summit will be hosted at Gallery One Visual Arts Center, where the ATJ Board will present a community honor—the Promoter of Justice Award—during the event.

Rural Internships (Kevin Plachy)

Kevin noted that all internship grant recipients have accepted the grants, funds have been dispersed, and all recipients have been invited to attend the STAR Summit. Julianne added that there are no outstanding items for this year's cycle, but the STAR Council should plan to discuss next year's cycle, including whether APR6 law clerks should be included.

Small Town and Rural Practice Day Proclamation (President-Elect Petrasek, Ashley Cummins)

President-Elect Petrasek noted that no further updates have been received about the proclamation that has been submitted.

Rural Day of Service (Kevin Plachy, Julianne Unite)

Julianne reminded the group that two Rural Days of Service are scheduled for the current fiscal year. The first event, originally planned for May 4, has been rescheduled to July 27 and will still take place in Chewelah, in Stevens County. Julianne explained that the rescheduling was necessary because no clients from the public had signed up. Julianne described several strategic adjustments planned to strengthen outreach for the upcoming July event. WSBA will take a more active role in recruiting clients and increasing public awareness, including engaging the Communications team for public relations guidance and exploring options such as making announcements on local radio stations. They also plan to contact WSBA members in the area to ask whether they know community members or clients who might benefit from the free services offered. Julianne noted that at least five attorneys who had volunteered for the original May date have confirmed their availability for July 27. Julianne added that planning continues for the second Rural Day of Service, scheduled for September 18 in partnership with the Northwest Justice Project, in Moses Lake.

Job Fair at Gonzaga (Sean King)

STAR Council Member Sean King shared thoughts after conducting a deeper review of outcome data from previous hiring events. Sean compared spring events to the most recent fall event held in November. Although employer registration and application numbers were higher in November, the offers accepted during the fall proved to be less “sticky,” meaning students were more likely to withdraw or pursue other opportunities later. Sean suggested this is not surprising given that students who receive offers early in the academic year often continue exploring other options. As a result, while the fall event appears stronger on the surface, the long-term outcomes are similar to spring events. President-elect Petrasek recalled that two hiring events were held the previous year and noted that concentrating on a single, well-executed event might be more effective. Sean agreed, adding that participation in April had been lower, likely due to “event fatigue” following the November fair. Sean explained that a spring event tends to produce more reliable student commitments and better aligns with hiring patterns that most stakeholders agree are becoming unhelpfully early. Sean emphasized that holding the fair in fall may inadvertently reinforce a trend toward earlier recruiting—something many schools and employers do not view as beneficial. Sean also stated that while holding one event per year seems best, alternating between spring and fall could remain an option depending on circumstances.

The group agreed to remove the item from the agenda until November unless planning needs change.

Rural Resources Community Action document

President-Elect Petrasek commented on a Rural Resources Community Action document that was included in the meeting materials primarily as an FYI, to inform the Council that such an assessment

exists and is focused on Eastern Washington. It was completed by Rural Resources Community Action in Colville.

Proclamation

WHEREAS, the rule of law is a fundamental principle that affirms every person is subject to the law, and that laws are made and applied in an impartial, transparent and consistent manner; and

WHEREAS, a strong legal infrastructure and a robust network of legal practitioners help ensure that rights are protected, duties are enforced and the public's trust in our judicial and legal systems is maintained; and

WHEREAS, a 2023 Yakima Valley needs assessment found far fewer attorneys per resident in the Yakima Valley than the statewide average, underscoring the legal service gap in rural Washington; and

WHEREAS, many residents of small towns and rural communities must travel great distances to appear in court or meet with an attorney; and

WHEREAS, while some Washingtonians can access legal services online, many still lack adequate broadband access or would be better served by in-person legal assistance; and

WHEREAS, people in rural areas and small towns have important legal needs, including wills, family law matters, business issues, discrimination claims, domestic violence protection, and criminal and civil representation; and

WHEREAS, increasing opportunities for rural attorneys and supporting them and the communities they serve will increase access to justice and ensure equal justice under the law, thereby sustaining the rule of law across Washington state;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Bob Ferguson, governor of the state of Washington, do hereby proclaim June 2026 as

Rural and Small-Town Legal Practice Month

in Washington, and I urge all people in our state to join me in this special observance.
