Welcome & Introductions; Approval of April Meeting Minutes – Mason

WYLC Chair, Mason Ji, opened the meeting at 12:02 p.m. and welcomed everyone in attendance. On motion by WYLC Member Alexander Reaganson, pending amendment of the inclusion of Ariel Cook's attendance at the April meeting, seconded by Mackenzie Lloyd, the WYLC unanimously approved the April WYLC Meeting minutes (12-0-0).

WSBA Updates – Chelle

WSBA Member Services and Engagement Specialist Chelle Gegax provided an update, and mentioned Board of Governors (BOG) Liaison Jordan Couch is unable to attend today's WYLC meeting due to the Budget and Audit meeting today but advised committee members to email Jordan with any questions. Chelle shared that WSBA volunteer applications are currently open, with an application deadline of May 30. The WYLC has not identified a Chair-Elect for next year and if anyone interested in applying should follow up with Chelle or apply online via myWSBA. WYLC Committee Member and Chair-Elect Alexander Reaganson offered to answer anyone's questions about the role. And Mason mentioned to reach out to if anyone has questions about the role of Chair.

Bylaws Amendment Update - Mason

Mason kicked off the bylaw amendment discussion by thanking the bylaw amendment project team for their work over the past month. A Washington Young Lawyer Definition survey was sent to all new lawyers and results are included in the current meeting materials. The final version of the bylaw amendment must be submitted to the BOG by June 12. The intent of surveying new members was to integrate results into the WYLC's proposal and cover letter to the BOG. Mason suggested the committee take five minutes to review the survey results. Mason noted the survey responses appear inconsistent and opened the floor for folks to offer some thought. WYLC Member Ariel Cook raised the issue of conflicting responses regarding the inclusion of LLLTs in the definition and asked whether the committee has clarity on whether they are, or should be, included in the definition. Mason responded, mentioning that the LLLT program is being sunsetted soon. WSBA Member Services and Engagement Manager Julianne Unite clarified that the LLLT program is not ending, but rather the program has and will not accept new applicants. LLLTs and LPOs are all considered members of the bar and are generally eligible for the same benefits and leadership opportunities as lawyer members, including congressional district and at-large diversity BOG seats and joining and serving on section executive committees. Julianne noted that the young lawyer definition as it stands, is unique as it's exclusive and narrow because it is limited to only lawyer members, which may explain the division reflected in the survey. Julianne added that the number of LLLTs will not increase; rather it would remain the same or even shrink, while LPOs remain an active licensure type that continues to accept new applicants and could expand, however the number has remained around 1000 for the past several years. Ariel asked for clarification that the definition is the only area that LLLTs and LPOs are excluded from compared to other benefits. Julianne confirmed that when the WSBA refers to "members", it always includes LLLTs and LPOs, except in the context of the young lawyer definition because it is limited to only lawyer members. Ariel commented that it seems odd that they have access to everything except this one category. Alex added that this discrepancy is a major focus for proposing a change to the definition. Alex asked if there are any expected changes for LPOs. Julianne confirmed that the LPO program will most likely remain the same and added that the LPO program has existed much longer than the LLLT program. Mason commented that that the narrow margin on the LLLT survey question was surprising and proposed that the definition project team committee get together to propose a final version of the definition to the full committee, acknowledging integrating the LLLT and LPO will be the tricky part. Alex noted tension between questions 9 and 10 and agreed that the project team get together and resolve some of the inconsistencies. Janta suggested gathering general feedback from the committee on whether or not there is a strong leaning around two questions: 1) including expanding to be 'members' instead of 'lawyers' (to include LLLT and LPOs), 2) giving extra time to people who were licensed first in another jurisdiction. Janta and Chelle will set up a poll for the committee to take during the current meeting. Julianne recommended filtering the survey data by certain types, and other ways, to see trends that the aggregate results do not show. This can be done live during the next project team meeting, which may assist in identifying the direction and what to propose.

Project Team Updates and Regional Reports - All

Financial Focus CLE - Chawisa

WYLC Member Chawisa Laicharoenwat shared that an additional speaker is needed to cover health insurance and disability. A speaker who will cover malpractice is confirmed. Chawisa encouraged the committee to reach out with names of potential speakers. Ariel suggested reaching out to Jordan Couch as a resource for an appropriate speaker referral.

Social Media - Ariel

Ariel introduced a plan for the WYLC's social media presence. Ariel proposed either forming a committee of 2-3 people or managing the accounts individually. Currently there are no active social media accounts as for the WYLC. Ariel noted the value of a social media (Facebook, LinkedIn, YouTube) presence to drive engagement and participation. There is an existing WYLC Facebook group but has not been updated since 2020. Ariel met with WSBA Communications Coordinator Connor Luk, to discuss creating a LinkedIn account specific to the WYLC. Ariel will create an Instagram account and aim to post once per month to maintain activity. The target is to launch the counts prior to the July After-Bar Social event. There are specific guidelines that will need to be adhered to, and a contract to sign. WYLC Member Hanna Harrison expressed interest to help. Ariel will send contract and guidelines to Hanna.

The committee took a few minutes to complete the poll to gather feedback on the definition.

Legal Lunchbox CLE - Hanna

Hanna provided an update after a meeting this morning with Chelle, Vanessa, and Tyler O'Brien (aka The Long-Haired Lawyer on LinkedIn). The Legal Lunchbox will take place on July 29, with the confirmed topic of digital professionalism and building your online presence, geared towards new lawyers. Tyler will be the presenter. A rough outline with key topics was drafted: growing a professional network, creating a LinkedIn profile, and developing a personal brand. Additional topics to include is considering other types of social media including YouTube, TikTok, and Instagram, and determining what are mandatory, and what are common mistakes (e.g. posting inappropriate content).

Mentorship Project Team - Janta

Janta shared that the project team has not yet held its first meeting. Hanna is the other member of the team. Chelle reminded the committee of a previously suggested idea to host a Brown Bag lunchtime event focused on the goals new and young lawyers, and potentially law students, are looking for in a mentorship program. Further discussion can take place at the next project team meeting.

Public Service Leadership Awards - Alex/Chelle

Chelle shared that 14 nominations have been submitted so far, noting six are for the same person. Nominations close at the end of May. Alex commented that the outreach efforts included sending communication to the pro bono and public service committees' listserv, pro bono counsel, and the public service and legal aid listservs, to ensure as much coverage as possible. Alex noted that while the program is limited to four winners, something to discuss at next meeting is whether increasing the awardee count to five is something to consider. Alex will share an update after a meeting with pro bono in Seattle on Tuesday.

New Ideas for Next Meeting – All

Mason summarized with two items to be added to the agenda for the June 2 meeting: Consideration for an additional PSLA award and addressing the bylaws amendment. Ariel added a request for committee members to share ideas for the first social media post as it is important to identify appropriate early content for the first couple of posts. Chelle confirmed that the PSLA recipient evaluations will occur at the June 2 meeting.

Chelle noted that the July 17-18, 2025 BOG meeting will be in Walla Walla. The WYLC is invited to dinner with the BOG on the evening of Thursday July 17, at 6:30 p.m. If unable to attend in person, there will be a Zoom option to join. The Marcus Whitman Hotel is \$176 for Thursday night and is a direct bill to WSBA for WYLC Committee Members. The WYLC meeting will take place on Friday, July 18, and run concurrent with the BOG meeting. Chelle will send an RSVP poll to track planned attendance for the BOG meeting. The morning of Friday, July 18 will include breakfast with the BOG. Friday WYLC meet 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. followed by the Local Hero lunch from 12:00 – 1:00 p.m., which the WYLC is invited to attend. Bylaws still on the calendar as second read. The room rate at the Marcus Whitman Hotel on Friday night is \$279. Mason plans to be there in person. Janta asked about transportation to Walla Walla. Chelle explained per WSBA fiscal policy, whatever the cheapest of the commute options is what should be used. Reimbursement questions should be directed to Chelle.

Eligibility Requirements

Award recipients must meet the "young lawyer" definition in the Washington State Bar Association (WSBA) Bylaws. Under the Bylaws, an active member is considered a young lawyer if at least one of two criteria is met: 1) the member has been admitted to practice for fewer than five years (in any state), or 2) the member is under 36 years of age.

Nomination Process

Candidates for the award must be nominated by another individual. To complete a nomination, complete the application below and email any supplemental materials, e.g. nominee's resume, articles, etc., that the nominee would like the WYLC to consider to newmembers@wsba.org. Please note the nomination deadline is May 29.

Selection Process

During the selection process, the WYLC will consider the nominee's leadership in their community and involvement in public service activities as described in RPC 6.1. Long-term service or an extraordinary contribution to the community will be considered, including:

- a) leadership and service in the local community or within a bar association;
- b) WSBA, ABA, or local bar association activities;
- c) Volunteering with pro bono or public service programs; or
- d) Writing a blog post for NWSidebar and/or writing an article for WSBA magazine.

The WYLC will select the award recipients at the June 2, 2025 WYLC meeting. All application materials will be included in the WYLC meeting materials packet and posted online. Confidential information will be redacted from publication. Recipients may only receive the award once during the WSBA fiscal year (October 1 – September 30). does not just take on referrals; shows up in person to reentry circles, community events, and client meetings, often after hours or outside standard legal contexts. approach recognizes that trust is earned over time, especially with individuals who have been harmed by legal systems. By aligning seeing legal work with community-led reentry support, ensures clients are not just legally represented but truly seen and accompanied. It commitment to justice-in-relationship exemplifies a rare level of compassion, humility, and professional integrity.
